Candidate Name: Shaun Minehan

Candidate Affiliation: Independent

I would say poor, generally. Cars are king in Moreland and dedicated cycling infrastructure is lacking, particularly in Gowanbrae, Hadfield and Oak Park. Brunswick is a little better.

I'd like see all barriers removed so that everyday cycling can be the norm. I'm particularly passionate about abolishing mandatory helmet laws which are a major deterrent to cycling participation. I'd like to see residents in Hadfield be able to cycle to Coburg in dedicated lanes, not paint on the road. Paint is not infrastructure.



Candidate Name: Angelica Panopoulos

Candidate Affiliation: Greens

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Despite some positive measures promoting cycling infrastructure, safety for our bike users in Moreland needs to increase. This is through educating all people in Moreland about road safety - regardless of how they get around our city. There are major gaps in the cycling network across Moreland, particularly when considering those that want to travel from the east to the west. One of my top priorities, if elected, is to increase the physical links that connect one side of Moreland to the other. Separated bike lanes, including the Covid recovery 'pop-up' ones are part of the solution. Additionally, the North-West ward would greatly benefit from the speedy completion of the Craigieburn Express Shared Path.

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What are your aspirations for people who want to ride in Moreland over the next four years and what will your contribution to that be?

Given that Councils are responsible for approximately 90% of the road network, they are well-placed to significantly influence the transition towards active and sustainable transport by making our local streets safer, less stressful and more attractive to walk and cycle. That's why I'm committed to significantly increasing the cycling and walking budgets if elected to Council. I'm also committed to ensuring that the walking and cycling projects committed to in Council's own capital works plans are built.

I will also strongly advocate for:

- Protected bike lanes on Sydney and Cumberland Roads
- Extending the Upfield Shared Path to Upfield
- Completing the Craigieburn Express shared path
- Delivery of the Covid 'pop-up' bike lanes, and explore opportunities for more of these
 - Getting the missing link finally built at the northern end of the Upfield shared path

We need to improve public transport: a duplicated and extended upfield line, extended 19 and 58 trams, as well as better busses across suburbs. We also need to improve pedestrian and cycling infrastructure and safety across Moreland to encourage more people to cycle or take public transport as a main form of transportation.

I don't however, support punitive measures to punish those who require a car. Shift workers, or those who work in areas with poor public transport should not be punished for using a car.

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What are your aspirations for people who want to ride in Moreland over the next four years and what will your contribution to that be?

I want to improve safety for cyclists in Moreland - this means expanding and improving bike paths and investing in road safety measures. I also want to oppose inappropriate development that threatens cyclist safety and discourages cycling such as the proposed Bunnings on Glenlyon Rd.

I do agree with the need to advocate for better public transport though since it is shocking compared to global standards. Also encouraging walking/riding for all of us is good considering increasing obesity rates but I don't believe drastically changing the landscape in an attempt to socially engineer people to ride their bikes/walk will have the desired outcome in sprawling cities like Melbourne. It can work in ancient cities in Europe which are very compact and grew organically but Melbourne, from federation, was a master-planned city to include a range of transport options, that is spread so far and wide in an already massive country so I also don't want to see barriers to people moving and visiting other suburbs and patronising businesses because they are unable to access these areas easily or quickly. If congestion, pedestrian safety and emissions are the stated problems to address, there are technological solutions already in existence and are being embraced

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I would ride more often if I could do so on a shared path rather than feel anxious on the roads and as infrastructure is something I want to see Moreland use a majority of their budget for, I would support the increase of shared foot/bike paths considering there are more kms of footpath than there are of roads and especially older footpaths could get renewed at the same time.

What are your aspirations for people who want to ride in Moreland over the next four years and what will your contribution to that be?

I would like to see more shared paths to encourage more bike riders and possibly advocating for a relaxation of helmet laws if riding exclusively on dedicated or shared bike paths. Riders on the road should always have helmets to protect against catastrophic injuries.
