If elected my priority with regard to making it easier for people to walk and ride is to:

ensure that council footpaths, crossovers and parking areas when created or upgrades comply with all DDA requirements as a minimum. Central Coast has recently adopted its Disability Access Plan developed by a group of people with a variety of lived experiences, and which I was proud to guide as chair. Council have endorsed a similar group as an enduring monitor of council infrastructure work to provide an all access 'lens' to everything we do.

Does my council have a bike plan?

Central Coast have a variety of Plans which consider bike users, but not a specific bike plan. As part of the NW group of councils' developing the shared pathway, access, path width and connectedness is front of mind.

I do support the completion of the Coastal Pathway. I see the following ways that I can work to see its completion:

Having served on the Cradle Coast Authority Board mid planning of the NW shared pathway, and hosted forums on this topic, I am intimate with the work, lobbying and length of time this work has taken. As a cyclist myself, I am very excited about the progress being made to connect the municipalities and concerned about recent statements by the current Mayor of Burnie about a possible lack of commitment to join the links. My commitment is the find a solution to the link between Ulverstone and Penguin along the 'old coast road'.

During the last term of Council I have been encouraging linkways to be created from outer areas into the town centres & coastal pathway so it will be easier for people to choose to walk & ride to destinations where possible.

One important part of this is trying to get more bike racks placed in the supermarket carparks & around town for secure storage of your bike or scooter.
